



Waiting is something that none of us really enjoy, but it's often where God's most profound work takes place in our lives. In the Bible, many of God's people experienced long periods of waiting, yet their patience and faith were rewarded in ways they couldn't have imagined. These moments remind us that while we wait, God is still working—shaping our hearts, strengthening our trust, and preparing something even better than we imagine.

One powerful example is Joseph, whose life was filled with waiting. After being betrayed by his brothers, sold into slavery, and wrongfully imprisoned, Joseph could have easily given up. But he trusted that God had a plan, even when he couldn't see it. Years later, Joseph became a leader in Egypt, and his position allowed him to save his family and countless others from famine. What looked like a series of setbacks was God setting the stage for something much greater (Genesis 37-50). Joseph's story teaches us that during the waiting, God is preparing us for what's to come.

Another powerful story of waiting is Abraham and Sarah's long wait for their promised son. God promised Abraham that he would be the father of many nations, but years passed without any sign of a child. Abraham and Sarah grew old, and Sarah even doubted the promise. Yet, at the appointed time, God fulfilled His word, and Isaac was born (Genesis 17-21). Abraham's faith through the waiting was counted to him as righteousness (Romans 4:20-22). Their story shows that even when God's promises seem delayed, He is always faithful to fulfill them.

Hannah, another example, longed for a child for many years. Her waiting wasn't easy, but she continued to pray and trust in God's timing. When she was finally blessed with a son, Samuel, her heart overflowed with gratitude—not just for the answered prayer, but for the faith God had strengthened in her during the wait. Hannah's story is a reminder that the waiting period is often a time of preparation and spiritual growth (1 Samuel 1-2).

Waiting on God can often feel like wandering in the wilderness, but in those moments of uncertainty, God is often at work in ways we can't see. It's in these times that our faith deepens and our reliance on Him grows. Proverbs 3:5-6 tells us, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths." When we trust Him during the waiting, we are aligned with His perfect plan. As we reflect on this season of thankfulness, let's remember that waiting is a gift. While we may not always understand the purpose of the wait, we can trust that God is always at work. His timing is perfect, and His plans for us are good. In the waiting, let's choose gratitude because we know He is working it out for our good," And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose" Romans 8:28


