Once upon a time, a young pastor in a country church walked along an old trail that led deep into the woods. He was troubled. His flock seemed so stale, so dead, so complacent.

But he did not seem to have the answer to get them out of the doldrums. No matter how many fiery sermons he preached, with his threats of hell and promises of heaven, they just sat there—no expressions, no "Hallelujahs", nothing.

They always seemed to appreciate the sermons, but in a superficial way. "Nice sermon" was the most common thing said as the congregation left the church each Sunday. From there, they would go to the local restaurants for Sunday dinner and then repeat the whole thing one week later, without an ounce of change that could be seen. And so, our young pastor hiked. He needed to clear his head and think. "What's wrong? I don't get how these people can be so unmoved by the Gospel!"

He came across a deep forest. The tall oak trees were close together, with brush surrounding each tree. The trail got very narrow, and branches continually stuck him in the face as he struggled to get through the massive thicket of trees. Dying trees reached in vain against more vigorous, taller trees for sunlight, and the underbrush smothered the forest floor for room to root. He wondered if he would ever get through the bramble he found himself in.

But he did. Next, he came to a place where pine trees grew. These trees were spread farther apart, and you could see where fallen pine needles neatly replaced the thick undergrowth around the trees. The trail widened, and there was more than enough space to walk. Every pine seemed proud and strong.

By the grace of God, our pastor suddenly understood his congregation's problem. "We are the oak thicket. We are too close together. We are not meant to be just in one place. We should be expanding and growing. We need to be out in the world spreading the Gospel, not just in our little church suffocating."

Does this describe you? Do you keep your faith in the oak thicket and not spread it to grow stronger? Will you spread the Gospel by showing your faith and proclaiming the Good News?
